From the Rector's desk: As we continue our journey through the season of Advent, in great anticipation of the birth of our Saviour, we reflect on the profound love of God for us, and, for all humanity, that he would come into the world as one of us in human form, to show us the way back to him. That is the essence of the Incarnation, God taking the form of a human being in Christ to lead us back to the light, after humanity had wandered far away from him. I like the story I read many years ago, which, in a very delightful way, describes the Incarnation. *"mother and children were heading out to church for the Christmas Eve service, father decided to remain at home and keep the fireplace burning ,as it was a very cold, snowy and windy evening. As he settled down to read in front of the fireplace, he heard several loud thumps on the window, he went to look and saw that it was some very small birds being blown around in the wind against the house and barn. In his compassion for them he put on his hat and coat and went out to open the barn door to afford them shelter from the wind and snow. As much as he tried to entice them into the comfort of the barn the birds would not enter. The thought entered his mind that if only he could become a bird he would fly into the barn and lead them safely inside. In that instant the story of the Incarnation became amazingly clear to him – God became a human being to lead us safely to his love and grace."* That is really what the Christian Church is all about, and, it is what all

of us are about as Christians, leading others to the light of Christ; God has the door always open, and we are the ones leading others to him. We might feel ill-equipped for such a task, but never-the-less it is what we are expected to do. In the gospel we quickly realize that God chooses the most unlikely messengers... a desert wild-man dressed in animal skins and eating locusts and wild honey... a poor shepherd, shunned by polite society, keeping watch in the fields... or today perhaps a school teacher, a waitress, a doctor, a plumber, a lawyer, a janitor, a laborer... or even a ...child. Jesus comes, not just to those of us in St. Philip's parish, but to those in New York city, Beverley Hills, Syria, Africa, North Korea... and anywhere else where God's people are to be found. Jesus comes to us in the words of a preacher, in the song of a choir, in the receiving of the Eucharist, but also in the siren of an ambulance, in a kind letter opened in a prison cell, in a visit to a nursing home, in a basket of food given to a family in need, in a pair of boots given to keep the feet of a child warm as he/she plays in the snow, and in the smile –or cry – of a child. As God often calls the most unlikely of people to do his work in the world, to shine the light of Christ in the darkness of the world, to give hope in the face of despair, let us ask ourselves the question – *what might God be calling me to do this Christmas and all the time?* What gifts do we have that can be a blessing to others? We all have something to give and to share with others, think about it and then let's do it! (Rev. Randy)

As we approach the end of another year, your rector and vestry are hoping that we will end the year at least financially on target as a parish. We would like to arrive at a time and place where fundraising activities will be used for outreach ministry more than meeting parish budgets out of necessity.

Our goal is worship and not conformity, so, whatever you choose to do is right for you.
