A WARM WELCOME IS EXTENDED TO ALL OUR PARISHIONERS AND VISITORS WHO ARE WITH US TODAY. WE HOPE THAT GOD WILL BLESS US AS WE WORSHIP HIM HERE TOGETHER AT ST. PHILIP'S CHURCH. From the Rector:

Greetings from St. Philip's parish. It's hard to believe that we are quickly approaching the end of another year, and still harder to believe that we have not yet emerged totally from the global pandemic. There are strong indications that we are getting there, such as the return to nearly normal daily lives as we work, shop, socialize and worship. Yet, the reality is we are still living with Covid-19 around us, and, in addition to that we are now in the flu season, and seeing an increase in other respiratory illnesses as well. A couple of weeks ago, I had the good fortune of being able to receive both my Covid booster and annual flu shot at a Sobeys pharmacy right on the spot, and would recommend getting the shots to everyone. A few years ago, getting the flu shot was not a high priority for me, however, as I creep up in the age group that are beginning to be at higher risk of contracting viruses, I am much more conscious of it, and making the effort to get as much protection as I can. After nearly three years of being in a pandemic, we realize that life had to return to some sense of normalcy, but we must still be vigilant and do what we can to protect ourselves and others around us.

Here at St. Philip's parish, we are gradually getting there, but we are still waiting for many of our church family members to rejoin us, and, if you are one of those, please know we have missed you, and are so looking forward to you reconnecting with us again soon. We are stronger when we are together, and the church is a more powerful instrument of God's love to the world when we worship together, grow together, and live together in faith.

We are now just one week away from the season of Advent, and the beginning of another new liturgical year. The church always starts its new year with the season of Advent (not to be confused with an ordinary calendar), and we switch from Year "C" to Year "A" with our lectionary readings and collects. The word "Advent" literally means "Coming", a time of expectant waiting and preparation for both the celebration of the nativity of Christ at Christmas, and the return of Christ at his second coming. Advent is the perfect time for us to make our return to church, and to make a new beginning. We have four weeks of Advent, and the church has long invited us to use these weeks as a time of deep reflection and meditation, as we prepare to welcome the Christ – child anew into the world at Christmas. A time for us to think about the kind of

world Jesus was born into, the Incarnation story, why God needed to come among us in human form, and what kind of world we live in today, and the promise that he will return again.

If we look at the world around us today, perhaps it bears some semblance to the kind of world Jesus was born into over 2000 years ago, despite the immense advancement of science and technology. God saw that humanity had strayed so far off track, so far away from God's desire for the world, so morally and ethically removed from Godly living, that the only solution was to come among us, to live as one of us in order to lead us back to God. Arguably, humanity has gone off track again in many ways, at least that's what I see when I look at global affairs and relations. In the last number of decades, we have less and less people identifying as Christians, and more and more not adhering to any religion or faith at all, and no longer see the church as being important or relevant to their lives. That, no doubt, has contributed to the challenges that the Christian Church faces today, as it struggles to survive and make a difference in the wider community. Albeit, the Church probably needs to be looking inwardly, divesting itself of the things that have become obstacles to proclaiming Christ to a broken world, in order to be all that we can be to God's people. What is the Church? Simply put, it is us, you, me, and everyone else that gathers Sunday morning to be fed and nurtured by Word and Sacrament; and, because the Church is comprised of human beings (albeit, Spirit-led) it is by its very nature imperfect and flawed. The good news is, that God never planned a perfect Church, but, rather, a place where we can come to find refuge from an often dark and dangerous world, to acknowledge our sins, our brokenness, and to be healed by the cleansing power of God's forgiveness, grace and mercy. The Church is not perfect, never has been, never will be, but it's what Jesus instituted, and ordained to be his instrument of peace, proclamation and healing in the world. It is when we come together that the Church becomes all that it's meant to be, and we become more and more who God created us to be.

I hope, as we begin the season of Advent, that you will choose to join us on this journey of faith, as we once more prepare to celebrate God's greatest gift to the world, the gift of Jesus Christ. He truly is **The Gift That Keeps On Giving!**

Unless you do this the chaplain may not know you are there.

A project to replace all the current lighting in the main part of the church building. Over the last couple of years, we have replaced much of the lighting in the building with less expensive and more efficient LED lighting. We were able to do this easily and at a nominal cost. We realize that much of our electrical costs annually comes from the lights we have in the nave and sanctuary of the church. As we look to the near future, when it is expected that electricity rates will increase significantly, we are looking for ways to reduce our consumption. The Anglican Church of Canada is also emphasizing our need to be ever more conscious of our responsibilities as good stewards of God's creation, and to do whatever we can to reduce our carbon footprint. At the moment vestry is interested in obtaining quotes from qualified electricians so as to get an idea of what the cost will be to transition to new and improved lighting. Once we are ready to proceed with the work, we hope the whole congregation will support the project financially.

We are working on re-covering some of our church seats with new material. Over the years some of the material covering our pews have become frayed and torn. We are in the process of covering some of them with new material, beginning with those in most need of repair. Thank you to Harvey & Ruth who have already started this work by doing the first two this past week.
