The eyes do a good many things, a good many more than their biology would dictate.

Eyes pierce.

Eyes stand sentinel and form the boundary between soul and space. They perceive and absorb the pathos and power of lived stories, catching, collecting and storing up periscopes in the crevices of the soul.

They absorb so much that words fail to describe what the eyes have seen.

The immensity of all that our eyes have seen weighs heavy. The scenes leave us wordless, mute, often dumb. They bring joy as we entertain our loveliest memories. They devastate as they invade our nightmares.

It is said, "Do not judge a man until you have walked a mile in his shoes."

I say, "Do not judge a people until you have seen with their eyes, their world-wearied, heavy, tootired eyes."

The eyes are the window into our souls; they are the prism that colors our world.

A sickness may lurk behind those eyes – not a sickness of body or even of mind, but a malady of the soul. A hole in the fabric of the psyche, a rupture in the self.

The scenes of life have generated a number of seeds that have been planted in the soil of our souls. What have our souls cultivated?

What sickness may be growing behind those eyes?

What scenes of grace and generosity, of patience and care can plant new seeds in the soil of another's soul?

In your words and deeds, even in the smallest of gestures, you can pepper the soul soil with antibodies of grace.

Your presence, your kindness, your love – these are the seeds that, once planted, can crowd out the cancerous growth hiding behind pained eyes.
