A WARM WELCOME IS EXTENDED TO ALL OUR PARISHIONERS AND VISITORS WHO ARE WITH US TODAY. WE HOPE THAT GOD WILL BLESS US AS WE WORSHIP HIM HERE TOGETHER AT ST. PHILIP'S CHURCH.

From the Rector: Today we complete the five Sundays of Lent (April 6th) and next Sunday will be the beginning of Holy Week, and, and from Palm Sunday until Good Friday we will experience the heartache of seeing our Lord betrayed, arrested, placed on trial, mocked, physically tortured and, finally, crucified horrendously on a cross. It all begins on Palm Sunday, as Jesus rides into Jerusalem, where he is welcomed and celebrated as a king. The Jewish people had long awaited a Messiah, a warrior king who would lead them into victorious battle over the Roman oppressors, thus freeing them from many years of oppressive domination. So, the people lined the streets of Jerusalem shouting Hosanna, blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, Hosanna in the highest. They waved Palm branches, they placed their garments on the ground so that Jesus could parade in and not get dirty and dusty. Their first clue that Jesus was not the kind of king they were looking for should have been the donkey he was riding upon. A donkey, a symbol of humility and passivity, was the opposite of a mighty strong horse that can be aggressive and always ready for battle. It didn't take long before the people would realize that this man, Jesus, was not the one they were waiting for. Jesus would talk about love, forgiveness, turning the other cheek, so, within a couple of days those same people would be shouting out – Crucify him, Crucify him. I suppose, given their disappointment, it may have been a natural human response, all they could see now was a certain future of hardship under Roman rule, their hopes for freedom were dashed. We have never lived under an oppressive government where our rights and freedoms are restricted and violated, and any form of protest from us is met with physical punishment, prison or even death. Though the world we live in today does cause us great concern about our safety and freedoms. Perhaps most of us would be disappointed to had we been standing there given the hardship of life at that time under Roman rule. They could not see at that point that Jesus was truly a king, the greatest king that ever lived, and that his kingdom encompassed both heaven and earth. Though his birth was in a lowly stable, born of poor earthly parents, lived a simple life, and often had

nowhere to lay his head, had no luxuries afforded to him, he would be the most majestic king to ever live. Jesus, at his arrest and trial, makes it very clear that his Kingdom is not of this world. His Kingdom is a heavenly one, his servants are you and I, and everyone on earth that bows their knee to him and professes him as Lord and Saviour. You and I have the benefit of knowing how the story ends, but the people of that first Palm Sunday, had no way of knowing what was about to unfold before them, and so we can't be too critical of them. Perhaps there have been times in our own lives when we have praised the name of Jesus, only later to angrily take that same name in vain. Jesus harbored no ill will toward them, his love extended to them even as they shouted for his crucifixion, and he asked God to forgive them all, even his executioners. Many of them in the days after his death, resurrection and ascension would become believers and servants, and tireless labourers in the vineyard of service, people like Saul, the greatest persecutor of Jesus and his followers, who, after his conversion would be known as Paul. The drama that started then is still ongoing, the last word is still unspoken, and you and I are not merely spectators watching from the sidelines of history, we are part of the ongoing events of Christianity that started then and is still being worked out. Join us as we prepare for the final sprint toward Easter (April 20th) going from the glory of the palms to the glory of the Resurrection. At a time when the world tilts more and more toward secularism, may we make an intentional effort to make Holy Week and Easter a very special spiritual journey with Jesus this year.

If you plan to attend the breakfast on Easter Sunday, following the 7:00 am service, please sign your name on the sheet provided in the foyer. There is no cost for breakfast.
